A virtual public involvement meeting was held to present the proposed NE J Street Interchange project in Bentonville, Arkansas.

NEJSreetInterchange.es.transportationplanroom.com from Sunday, February 13 through Friday, March 4, 2022. A virtual public officials meeting and a virtual public involvement meeting live event were both held via Microsoft Teams video conference on Thursday, February 17, 2022. Special efforts to involve minorities and the local community in the virtual public involvement meeting included the following:

- Display ads placed in the Northwest Arkansas Democrat Gazette (February 13 and 20)
- Display ads placed in La Prensa Libre (February 10 and 17)
- Notification/website link posted on City of Bentonville's website (February 13)
- Letters mailed to public officials
- Emails sent to public officials
- Postcards mailed to property owners and other community contacts
- News release published by City of Bentonville
- Multiple rounds of outreach through City of Bentonville's social media

The virtual public officials meeting was held at 3:30 p.m. on February 17, 2022. The first half of the meeting consisted of a team presentation, including where to find information on the public involvement meeting website, and a detailed discussion of the conceptual map exhibit and typical section for an arterial boulevard in the city's Master Street Plan. Throughout the meeting, attendees voiced their questions, comments, and concerns utilizing the Microsoft Teams chat function or by unmuting their device microphones.

The virtual public involvement meeting live event was held at 5:30 p.m. on February 17, 2022. The first half of the meeting consisted of a team presentation, including instructions on how to submit comments, utilize Microsoft Teams, and navigate the public involvement meeting website, and a detailed discussion of the conceptual map exhibit and typical section for an arterial boulevard in the city's Master Street Plan. The meeting continued with a live question-and-answer forum

### **Virtual Public Meeting**

Garver staff reviewed all comments received and evaluated their contents. The summary of comments listed below reflects the personal perception or opinion of the person or organization making the statement. The sequencing of the comments is random and is not intended to reflect importance or numerical values. Some of the comments were combined and/or paraphrased to simplify the synopsis process, and the number of individuals is a best approximation.

### **Summarized Comments**

88 individuals submitted a total of 138 comments

### **Need for the Project**

13 individuals expressed comments in support of the project:

- A majority said the project is needed to help handle increased traffic and growth in the area. Reasons provided include the following:
  - There are not enough access points from the interstate on the north side of Bentonville
  - The exits for Highways 72 and 102 are not sufficient
  - o It will reduce congestion at J and Central Streets
  - It will reduce congestion at Central and I-49
  - It will reduce congestion at McNelly and Hwy, 72
  - It will provide faster access to I-49
  - It is needed for growth in Pea Ridge area
  - o It is needed for Crystal Bridges expansion and influx of traffic
  - o It is needed in preparation of the new Walmart Home Office
  - o It is needed for overall growth on the north side of Bentonville

### **Pedestrian and Bicycle Path**

12 individuals commented about the pedestrian/bicycle path. These comments expressed the following:

- A majority requested that the path be moved to the west side of NE J Street to avoid the interstate ramp connections at Interstate 49
- Ensure safety for bicyclists and pedestrians; adequate separation needed; ensure greenspace
- Make the path 12 to 14 feet wide
- Build a pedestrian tunnel parallel with the creek crossing
- Concern that the project will negatively impact bicyclists because it will cut through a welltraveled gravel bike route; close proximity to bike trail systems; will limit future trail expansion

### **Chapel Hill and Allencroft Residents**

34 individuals submitted 85 comments and identified themselves as residents in the Chapel Hill subdivision area. A majority of these comments were identical or near identical in their wording.

- The **primary statements** expressed of the following:
  - A four-lane boulevard is too wide and will negatively impact the Allencroft, Chapel Hill, and Hawthorne Heights neighborhoods; there is not enough space to widen to four lanes with a median
  - Concern about safety for families, cyclists, and the community
  - The project will increase traffic and speeds on NE J Street
  - Residents do not want property taken or impacted
  - The City should prioritize pedestrians and cyclists over vehicles, and this project contradicts the city's investment in creating a cycling community
  - There is already adequate, direct access to area from Walton, Central, 8th, and
     14th streets
  - The expansion would be disruptive to and impact bike access and the trail system in the area
- These comments suggested the following primary alternatives to expanding NE J Street:
  - Extend McCollum to connect with the interstate and the current J Street bridge;
     reasons provided include disruption to fewer people and less expensive
  - Keep NE J Street as a two-lane road until it is north of the neighborhoods
- Additional comments included the following:
  - Questions and concerns about the increased utility demand on the city's infrastructure and how the city is coordinating with the county on sewer, utilities, and wastewater for future growth
  - Concern about vehicles cutting through neighborhoods
  - Concern about increased traffic and congestion
  - Concern about increased noise
  - Concern about any impact to wetland areas
  - Concern about ability to enter and exit neighborhoods
  - Concern about \$37 million cost, including cost of moving power poles and lines
  - Concern about decreased home value
  - Request to design improvements around minimal number of lanes, narrow lanes, ample green space, low speed limit, and traffic calming devices
  - Request to keep boulevard as two or three lanes, consistent with other areas of town with roads going through residential areas

### **Other Comments**

The other 29 individuals expressed the following:

- Questions about how the alignment of NE J Street would continue north of I-49, and whether it would connect to Water Tower Road, Price Coffee Road, or Ford Springs
- The city should focus on completing projects already started or in construction
- The city should focus on other street improvements, including Moberly, 29th near Sam's Club Home Office, and 8th Street
- The west side of the city is more important for growth; Centerton should be annexed into Bentonville
- There are already enough access points to I-49
- There are enough access points to areas and businesses in this area of the city
- Expansion is only impacting the middle-class side of the road and not the million-dollar homes
- The project would be a waste of taxpayer dollars and not worth the large expense
- Question about possibility of Chapel Hill being a gated community to limit access and increase security
- Question about whether coordination would occur with AT&T for their planned installation of fiber infrastructure to minimize construction activities in the area
- Concern that it will increase traffic and congestion
- Consider a change to the I-49 ramp design: single-point, diverging diamond, or dumbbell to accommodate future traffic
- Owner concern about impact to Keystone property and building with the road expansion
- Concern from a resident on NE J Street that their area of the road is remaining dirt and
  won't be paved; previous drafts showed their section of road would become paved; concern
  that increased traffic will exacerbate the clouds of dust kicked up by vehicles that infiltrate
  their home; already seen issues with dust due to more traffic after opening of bike trails

Do you have any comments on the proposed NE J Street Interchange project?: I support the project however there are some critical improvements I would implore: 1) Move the bicycle trail to the west side of the road as it approaches the interchange, having the trail on the opposite side of the onramps. Cyclists and pedestrians will be much more comfortable not having to cross 4 onramps - 4 points of collision. 2) Reduce the road from 4 lanes to 3, two directions and a turning lane in the middle. Studies have shown that 3 lane roads can carry the same capacity as 4 lanes with multiple added safety benefits - less points of conflict from people changing lanes, more visibility for drivers and cyclists, no traffic jams or rear ending caused by people waiting to turn left, less speeding - all without sacrificing capacity. The increased safety of the 3 lane road versus the 4 allow for a better experience for everyone: pedestrians, cyclists, and even drivers. If 4 lanes need to be kept as the road comes off the interchange, going south, keep that section with trees in the median, but then reduce the road to 3 lanes as it approaches the neighborhoods into town - think of the children! As mentioned in the meeting on February 17th, a four lane road is too wide given the current layout of north J Street. Garver Engineering Firm conceded this fact during the meeting. With Allencroft, Chapel Hill, and the new Hawthorne Heights development, there is simply not enough space to accommodate four lanes and a center median without encroaching on the properties of residents who live there. 

Another concern that was just brought to my attention is the potential cost of the project. The projected budget of \$37 million may not be sufficient considering the cost of road construction, existing topography which creates the need for a new bridge, construction of a new I-49 interchange, any infrastructure work necessary to accommodate the proposed project, and will be very disruptive to residential areas and access to bike trails. I believe there are other ways these funds could be put to better use.

I was also not aware of the intrusion on a significant amount of wetland area, which is a major concern for any project or development. I'm sure the engineer is familiar with the time and cost necessary to obtain approval and comply with the appropriate regulatory agencies in this regard.

Should another interchange become necessary at some point in the future, I believe the city should consider other, more cost effective, and less intrusive ways to accomplish the same thing.

#### Some examples include:

- I have addressed this option in more detail in my previous emails, but believe extending McCollum to the existing interstate overpass instead of extending J Street would accomplish the same objectives and be much less expensive and much less intrusive to residential areas.

Do you have any comments on the proposed NE J Street Interchange project?: With the City upgrading their road standards, the wider road with larger sidewalks with more green space, the proposed road will not fit within the area just north of Tiger and J intersection. The plots from the subdivision show the set-back requirements for a total of 80'. The proposed design of 95' will cause unnecessary financial issues for the City. All the high voltage power lines will need to be moved a substantial distance. Resulting in rerouting in a significant portion of the electrical power feeders to the homes in both subdivisions. All of the communications, fiber optics, natural gas distributions, and storm water drains will need to be relocated increase the project burden for the tax payer. If this was on your 20 year plan, why did the planning department and the city utility allow or install this? The current paved section of J street is 30 feet wide. This is sufficient for a two-lane road with a turn lane in the middle. Assuming you do not move the utilities on the east side of J. A minimum of 10' will need to be taken from the green space on the west side. This will put the road at the end of all the homeowner's fences and in some cased inside the fence. At that point the City is violating their own setback requirements for the back of the foundations. A standard road is 12' wide. Narrowing the lanes to 10' will not necessary reduce speed or improve safety. There numerous case studies where municipalities are going on a road diet (four lanes to three). These case studies all demonstrate improved traffic flow and safety. Genesee County preformed seven reductions from 4 lanes to 3 with a significant safety improvement. These saw a 58% reduction in head-on left turn crash types with an overall reduction on 32% for general accidents. However, the plan proposed by Garver Engineering with create a rolling stop with a high acceleration region in a residential district. The argument for using J Street as a major norther artery for getting traffic from the new home office is flawed. The plan clearly shows no four-lane plant for J Street between Tiger and Central. Traffic will flow out of the new home office for a northernly route and be forced to single file in-front of Crystal Bridge and the park. The construction of a 4-lane north of Tiger will create a speed situation. Traffic will move closer to 50 mph vs the current 35-40 now on Tiger. Assuming the city doubles in size in the next 10 year the road development plan does not take into account all the additional requirements to develop the land to the north. If the area to the north cannot be development than due to utility infrastructure needs, why spend the \$37 million. Lower the scope of the project and use the existing J street bridge over the freeway. Access to I-49 could be added for a significate price savings. As the vast majority of the growth will go west, please justify why building a 4- lane road to the airport would not be a better us of taxpayer funds. ### La obesidad perjudica la salud del cerebro durante toda la vida, pero los científicos no saben por qué

Cualquiera que haya subido demasiadas libras sabe que el sobrepeso pu ede hacernos más lentos Con el tiempo, si esas libras se convierten en obesidad, pueden ocasionar graves daños y poner a la persona en riesgo de una amplia gama de enferme-

De hecho, tener demasiado peso en el cuerpo también puede dañar el cerebro.

Las investigaciones demuestran que la obesidad influye en la salud cerebral a partir de la infancia y hasta la edad adulta. Puede afectar desde las habilidades de la función ejecutiva - o sea, la compleja capacidad de iniciar, planificar y llevar a cabo tareas - hasta el aumento sustancial del riesgo de padecer demencia. Hacia la mediana edad, las consecuencias del exceso de peso son considerables. En varios estudios se ha demostrado que los adul-tos de mediana edad con un índice de masa corporal (IMC) igual o superior a 30, lo que se considera obesidad, tienen probabilidades mayores de padecer demencia comparados con sus pares de neso saludable.

No obstante, los inves tigadores siguen tratando de determinar las razones por las que el peso adicional perjudica el cerebro; si el mayor riesgo de demencia se va acumu-lando a lo largo de la vida; o, si la obesidad afecta al organismo de forma diferente en las distintas etapas de la vida.

También es posible que los retos cognitivos sean lo primero que ocurre y que estos contribuyen a la mala conducta ali-mentaria desde la infan-



cia, dijo Alexis Wood, profesora adjunta de nutrición pediátrica del Centro de Investigación de Nutrición Infantil del Colegio de Medicina de Baylor, en Houston. El centro funciona en colaboración con el Servicio de Investigación Agrícola del Departamento de Agricul-

tura de Estados Unidos. "Hay pruebas bastante sólidas y sustanciales que abarcan toda la infancia. desde los primeros años hasta la adolescencia, que demuestran que el tener un mayor peso se relacio-na con un menor funcionamiento cognitivo sobre todo la función ejecutiva", dijo. "El porqué de esto se sigue debatiendo".

La obesidad, que no deja de aumentar en Estados Unidos, también resulta un tema muy preocupante.

De acuerdo con los

Centros para el Control y la Prevención de Enfer medades, casi un 42% de los adultos quedaron en la categoría de obesos en 2018, con casi un 45% de entre 40 a 59 años de edad. Entre los niños v adolescentes, las tasas de obesidad aumentaron con la edad: más del 13% de los menores de 5 años: el 20% de los de 6 a 11 años y el 21% de los de 12 a 19

La pandemia no ha hecho mucho para ayudar a frenar estas estadísticas. En septiembre de 2021, los CDC afirmaron que el ritmo del aumento de la IMC se duplicó durante la pandemia en comparación con el periodo anterior. Los mayores saltos se observaron en los niños de 6 a 11 años y en los que ya tenían sobrepeso antes de la pandemia.

Algunos estudios han

trazado el inicio de la relación entre la dieta, el peso y la salud cerebral hasta el vientre materno Según Wood, en la primera infancia ya existe una relación entre el exceso de peso y la capacidad de un niño para controlar y dirigir su comportamiento, integrar nueva información, planificar y resolver problemas. Lo que no ha quedado claro es qué es lo que sucede

Por ejemplo, en un estudio publicado en el American Journal of Epidemiology se descubrió que, durante la etapa de estudio preescolar, los niños con mayores habilidades verbales y de función ejecutiva era menos propensos a tener sobrepeso posteriormente durante la infancia. Otras investigaciones muestran que los niños pequeños

con su entorno", dijo Wood, "Podrían no ser tan buenos en regular la ingesta de alimentos para balancear sus necesidades energéticas. Quizás conan cuando no tienen hambre, cuando ven algo muy apetecible como una golosina. Una menor función cognitiva en esta área altera la conducta alimentaria y predispone a comportamientos alimen tarios inadecuados". Sin embargo, si los prob-

lemas de peso aparecen antes que los cambios cognitivos, quizás se deba a que el exceso de grasa aumenta la inflamación. Con el tiempo, eso puede ocasionar "cambios en la conectividad, la estructura y el funcionamiento del cerebro", dijo.






